Congratulations, you just earned your first amateur radio license. Now you just need to wait for your license to show up in the FCC ULS license database. In the meantime, you may want to shop for a radio. Besides reaching out to a local radio club for assistance, you may also want to look online at some reputable retailers as well.

A common place that you can introduce yourself is by creating a profile for free at one of the most popular online call books at **QRZ (qrz.com)**. You can tell a little bit about yourself, this is usually where hams go to look up who they are speaking with, people usually show pictures of their ham shack.

You can also look at membership with the **American Radio Relay League** (arrl.org), where you can create a free 90-day trial and review all the member benefits, besides receiving a nice magazine monthly with your membership.

Once you have a radio and have some repeaters programmed, *get on the air*, check into any of the *radio nets* that occur weekly. it's a great way to get out and become familiar with your equipment and make sure it is in working order, and an opportunity to become known in your community.

If you are interested in upgrading to the next amateur class license, **General Class**. This will increase your HF frequency privileges.
